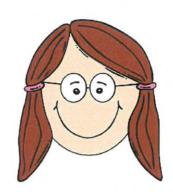

Explain the words that you are working on. Introduce the first picture and talk about what is happening. Give the child the start of the sentence and then encourage the child to use the correct word to complete the sentence when they are shown the second picture.

As the child gains in confidence, you can mix up the pictures to work on is/are and has/have during a session.
